## **HISTORY AND MISSION**

**This Christian children's home in Kenya (East Africa) for school-aged boys who are at risk**, began informally in 1999 in Nairobi, in the home of missionaries from the USA, Jon and Phyllis Masso. By December 2000, they relocated to a rental home of their own in the capital city of Nairobi and were known as SCREAM--Kenya. In December 2006, it was officially registered, with a name change and a new board, as Ahadi Family Kenya.

**All of these boys are vulnerable and in need of care and protection** due to many factors such as parental death, neglect, abuse, abandonment, mental illness, incarceration, etc. Most of the boys are orphans who have no relatives able to care for them at this time and some were street children.

**"Ahadi" (pronounced A-ha'-dee) is the Swahili word for "Promise."** We believe these boys have promise, that is potential, and we promise to do our best to help them recognize and develop that potential, and to care for them and protect them. The boys also promise to be obedient and responsible. In November 2012, God blessed us with a permanent home in a rural area on the Kapiti Plains, about 30 miles East of Nairobi, where zebras, giraffe, gazelles, ostrich, impala, wildebeest live nearby.

## **LEGAL REGISTRATION**

**Ahadi Family Kenya is a Children's Charitable Institution (CCI), registered with the Department of Children's Services in Athi River Sub-county, Machakos County.** Certificate number 000054. After the Sub-county Children's Officer and our Social Worker have verified their need to be cared for outside their own home, the boys are legally committed to our care through the Mavoko law courts.

# CORE VALUES

## CARE AND PROTECTION

At Ahadi Family Kenya, boys receive not only basic physical needs such as food, clothing, shelter, and medical care, but are also given Christian nurture; quality educational opportunities; social guidance and correction; love; and stability. They are cared for and protected by four



Christian, qualified staff (including a social worker) who recognize their uniqueness and are familiar with and agree to the tenets of the Children’s Act which are incorporated into our Child Protection Policy. If more than one child in a family is in need of care and protection, we take in the boy siblings, and at times assist in finding appropriate care for the girls in the family.

It takes a village to raise a child, and so we make sure the boys interact with the community. In this way, they are not fearful when moving around outside the compound, but learn how to relate to the “outside world.”

## FAMILY STYLE ATMOSPHERE

**The boys make life-long, deep friendships in the family-style environment** that is provided for them, where we make every effort to enable them to mix with the community and not feel institutionalized. At any given time, we have 20 to 30 boys in our care and also assist with educational needs of others in the community.

They walk to a neighbourhood school, or go to boarding school with other children (usually, in Kenya, children in Kenya go to inexpensive boarding schools); go to a neighbourhood church; play with neighbourhood children; go to a dentist’s office, clinic, barbershop, etc. At Ahadi, they sleep in a bedroom, not a dormitory; eat in the sitting room or dining area; and play games outdoors in a spacious play area. Soccer is their favorite game.

Our social worker, in conjunction with the Sub-county Children’s Officer and local chief, also monitors their extended families of origin and makes every effort to reunite them with relatives when possible. During school breaks, they usually go visit a relative so they don’t lose touch with their family of origin.

## EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES

**We educate our boys through college level, if they qualify.** Some of our boys are headboys in their schools, are scouts, play on the school sports teams, are active in drama, singing, etc. **Eleven of our “alumni” are currently in 10 different universities and colleges in Kenya, four others are taking professional courses, two have applied to medical school,** and 27 have already graduated—two with Master’s Degrees, one finishing MA soon in Korea, and one with a Post Graduate Diploma. They study a variety of majors, including engineering, medicine, food and beverage preparation, communication, management information systems, community development, business management, economics, finance, social work, psychology, public health, logistics, computer science, international relations, etc.

Some of our older alumni have married and started their families after completing their formal education and have responsible jobs in business, environmental health, banking, IT, engineering, video production, accounting, etc. (Others, are still searching, in a nation with of 50% unemployment.)

## **SPIRITUAL NURTURE**

The staff, who are all believers in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord, nurture the Ahadi boys on a day-to-day basis in a Christian setting. We acknowledge Jesus Christ by the way we live, as summed up by Him in loving God with all our hearts, souls and minds, and loving our neighbours as ourselves. We also acknowledge Him by giving thanks; making our needs (and others) known to Him in prayer; singing praises; by informal worship each evening; special devotions on Saturday evening, and on Sunday with fellow believers in the community at a local Christian church.

## **GOVERNANCE AND STAFFING**

A seven-member Board of Directors, including 4 Kenyans, an Ahadi alumnus, and 2 Founders, sets policies and makes major decisions.

A household supervisor, social worker, cook and relief person are the major staff, assisted by a junior staff who is an alumnus of Ahadi Family (finished high school) and who helps with care-taking of the house, which is owned by Ahadi Family Kenya Trust. A night watchman is also employed to provide security, and a grounds-keeper to maintain the 2-acre compound and greenhouse.

## **FUNDING**

God uses well-wishers as channels of His blessing, making this Christian ministry possible. Most of our supporters live in the US, but have visited Ahadi Family Kenya, and are impressed with what they see. They spread the word to friends.
